- 14, 20 - Tomato, Marigold, Basil
- 15, 16 - Microgreen Marigold, Apricot Agastache
- 17 - Tomato, Eggplant
- 18 - Cabbage
- 19 - Tomato, Cauliflower
- 21 - Nasturtiums
- 22 - Cardoon, Cauliflower
- 23 - 25 - Bean, Cucumber, Marigold, Lettuces, Nasturtium
- 26 - Squash, Cauliflower, Cabbage

We are demonstrating a combination of integrated pest management and companion planting methods in order to keep pests and problems from damaging our harvest.

Companion planting is the technique of combining two plants for a particular purpose. If your crops are regularly attacked by insects, you can use companions to hide, repel, or trap pests. Other companions provide food and shelter to attract beneficial insects for pollination or protection. Also, some plants grow well together since they don't compete for light or rooting space.

The different patterns of the plants were planned to keep the garden healthy and beautiful!
